

National Weather Service Heritage Projects
Terms and Conditions for Website Submissions by Former NOAA Employees

All submissions for the National Weather Service Heritage website will be reviewed by members of the National Weather Service Heritage Projects Team (Team) for appropriateness and suitability, and may be edited. Do not submit original materials until requested to do so by a member of the National Weather Service Heritage Projects Team (Team). Materials (even copies) of material deemed unsuitable for the site by the Team will be returned.

Works, including photographs, created by federal government employees in the course of their duties are not subject to copyright protection in the U.S. and are part of the Public Domain. Images, documents, research and other materials created by federal government employees in the course of their duties then shared via this website will remain government property. The Team may, at its discretion, accept images, documents, research, and other materials from members of the public, provided the submitter can attest to ownership of the materials and waives potential copyright and related rights to any contributions worldwide through the [Creative Commons Zero 1.0 Universal Public Domain Dedication](#).

Photographs should showcase the work of NWS (and predecessor agency) staff, e.g., field observations, storm surveys, engagement with new technologies and other active scenes. Do not submit portraits, group pictures from office events, or images that form a data collection. The Team reserves the right to not accept photographs that do not meet the criteria for inclusion.

Do not submit material that includes Personally Identifiable Information (PII), defined in 2 CFR § 200.79:

PII means information that can be used to distinguish or trace an individual's identity, either alone or when combined with other personal or identifying information that is linked or linkable to a specific individual. Some information that is considered to be PII is available in public sources such as telephone books, public Web sites, and university listings. This type of information is considered to be Public PII and includes, for example, first and last name, address, work telephone number, email address, home telephone number, and general educational credentials. The definition of PII is not anchored to any single category of information or technology. Rather, it requires a case-by-case assessment of the specific risk that an individual can be identified. Non-PII can become PII whenever additional information is made publicly available, in any medium and from any source, that, when combined with other available information, could be used to identify an individual.
